

#### Testimony FROM THE MISSION

#### I HAD NO LIFE UNTIL GOD Saved Me

My name is Frankie Powell, and I wanted to share my testimony with you. I grew up on the Eastside in Athens, Georgia. I remember growing up in a gambling house with my grandparents. Their house was around the corner from where I lived with my mother, and as a child, I would go between the two. My neighborhood was abundantly full of drugs, violence, and crime. I have a vivid memory of seeing the barrel of a shotgun at the age of six. My granddaddy ran a gambling operation with an iron fist, and I learned quickly to manipulate and deceive people at a very early age. To others, my environment may appear tragic or unthinkable, but to me it was normal. This was all that was around me, day in and day out. Crime became too familiar to me; a normal way of life.

I began selling for others and setting up crimes for them when I was 12 years old. I even stole from my grandparents when I was 13 years old. They put me out of their house, and it was years before I was allowed back into their home. My mom packed up and moved us to the Westside of Athens. I remember feeling scared and alone for the first time. My heart became hard and any chance of taking a different path for me was gone. I no longer resisted the life around me, no longer had dreams of something different, no longer had hope.

#### Spiritual Wellness AWARENESS MONTH

I am sure that many of you know that, February is Spiritual Wellness Awareness Month. In a world that loves to come up with its own idea of what it means to be spiritually well, the question definitely needs to be asked, what is spiritual wellness? According to some of the clinical definitions floating around, it is the ability to establish peace and



harmony in our lives and to be fulfilled by what we do by aligning our values with our actions. Other definitions describe spiritual wellness as being connected to something greater than yourself as you search for life's meaning and purpose. Don't get me wrong, that sounds wonderful, however, we must be very careful in where we begin to search for these things. Especially since we live in a world that is so easily swayed by popular opinion and demand and always searching for the next new fad.

I believe the only remedy for this is for us, as Christians, to begin to realign our view of ourselves with the way God sees us and to live within that reality. So in a sense, our spiritual wellness is affected by having a faulty view of our identity. Our identity, as Christians, is in Christ. When we see ourselves through a fogged lens, we see everyone and everything around us through that same distortion. In Colossians chapter 3, Paul lays out some spectacular declarative truths about our identity in Christ, it's when we trust these truths about us that we can then experience the very realness of spiritual wellness.

That is the absolute beauty of being around the men and women at the Rescue Mission of Middle Georgia, they are in the beginning stages of learning and trusting what God says about them. This "Amazing Grace" changes everything, and whether we realize it or not, it's what we are all so desperately searching for.


Here I am, now 16 years old, using cocaine, selling it to anyone around me, stealing and hustling. This was my life and would be for the next twenty-plus years. I saw no other way. I remained in and out of jail with my first arrest at 15 years old. I earned a name for myself on the Westside of Athens; people knew who I was and what I could do for them. The Eastside was known as the Iron Triangle, and I was known as the main hustler. There were different churches all around our neighborhood. Every 2-3 blocks there was a different church, and believe it or not, I went to church as a kid with my grandparents. God's word was spoken into my heart early on, and I truly believe that He has saved my life more than once.

The only other positive influence I had in my life was a Coach from the Westside. I was pretty good at baseball and football, and I remember that Coach Billy Henderson tried and tried to get me to play ball for him. He tried to save me from the life I knew, but I resisted and would never give this "other life" a chance. He never stopped pursuing me. There are times that I wonder how my life would have been different if I had listened to Coach Henderson and just given it a chance. I was so wrapped up in "the life" I knew that I could not see any other way.

My twenties and thirties were the same as my teen years. Living a life of crime, selling, and using drugs, hustling, and being arrested time and time again. I have had 4 attempts on my life. Three of my very close family members have died because of gun violence. I associated with the worst of the worst, and some may have considered me the worst of all.

The day I realized that I needed help, was when I saw the kids that grew up in my neighborhood following in my footsteps. They were doing the same things as me. I taught them to live a life such as mine. They looked up to me, the known drug dealer and hustler of the area. Man, this sure hit me hard! God used this moment to change my heart. I knew that I was the one that was ultimately to blame. I had been influencing them, teaching them this life and they idolized me. The truth is there was nothing in me to idolize. I knew, at this

moment, that I had to change my life. What would their futures be if I led them in a different direction? This was so heavy on my heart that I began looking for a rehab program. I was originally headed to Atlanta to a program there, but God had a different plan. He brought me to the Rescue Mission on June 3, 2020. Since being here, I have found peace with God. He is restoring my life, and I have hope for the future. I am passionate about cooking, arranging music, and poetry. I journal and try to write down my thoughts and prayers every day. I can now look back and see God's hand of protection and how he has never left my side. He waited patiently for me to surrender to Him, and I am in awe of His love and faithfulness. At my lowest, He was there. He has always been there and always will be. I feel His love and will heed to his guidance in my life.

I have so many regrets, but I know God has a plan for me. I pray He will allow me to go back to the Eastside of Athens and speak truth into the lives of those that I destroyed. I desire to be a light for Him in that dark place.

I can only remember being sober for 3 months consecutively. I used when I was locked up and when I was in prison. I have now been sober for 8 months, and I am 40 years old. I thank God for saving me! It is by His hand alone that I am still alive and breathing. Please pray for me as I continue my recovery here at the Mission!

#### Teen Dating Violence AWARENESS MONTH

February is Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month. Approximately 1.5 million high school boys and girls in the U.S. admit to being intentionally hit or physically harmed in the last year by someone they are romantically involved with.



Sadly, only 1/3 of the teens who were involved in an abusive relationship confided in someone about the violence. They hesitate to seek help because they do not want to expose themselves and are unfortunately consumed by shame.

1 in 3 young people will be in an abusive or unhealthy relationship mainly because of their negative beliefs of self and their need for acceptance and love. God created us with those needs and if they are not fulfilled in healthy family relationships and through the right relationship with Jesus, then we start to seek to fulfill those needs in other ways.

What we believe drives our thoughts, which control our emotions/feelings, leads to our behavior patterns. If a teen is suffering from negative core self-beliefs, they start to think that something is wrong with them. They start to experience feelings of depression, anxiety, and hopelessness. This then leads the teen down a path of destructive behavior patterns including unhealthy relationships.

Let us be a community that begins the breaking of this cycle at home. Especially in these times of uncertainty, we must make an effort to spend quality time together with our children. Have intentional conversations with them that will build and strengthen your relationship with them. Communicate to your child in positive ways. Listen with undivided attention when they speak and make it safe to talk about feelings, including difficult ones. Lift them up, praise them, encourage them, show them appreciation, love, and encouragement through words and affection.

Be the example for your teen of what healthy relationships look like. Guide them and lead them to be strong, honest, and confident in their relationships.
