What it means to give to the Rescue Mission of Middle Georgia

Many of us have heard of the phrase "labor of love," but have you ever really looked at the definition? We tend to think of this phrase when we think of the unpaid work that we do out of the goodness of our hearts, or the hobbies we love doing but don't get paid for, but what does the phrase "labor of love" actually mean?

Webster's dictionary defines "labor of love" as: "A labor voluntarily undertaken or performed without consideration of any benefit or reward." The Oxford Lexico defines it as: "A task done for pleasure, not reward." While many people attribute the phrase "labor of love" to writers going back as far as the 1500s, especially Shakespeare's comedy "Love's Labor's Lost," did you know the expression actually comes from the Bible?

In Hebrews 6:10 it says: "For God is not unjust to forget your work and labor of love which you have shown toward His name, in that you have ministered to the saints, and do minister." 1 Thessalonians 1:2-3 says: "We give thanks to God always for you all, making mention of you in our prayers; Remembering without ceasing your work of faith, and labor of love, and patience of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ, in the sight of God and our Father."

At the Rescue Mission of Middle Georgia, we see labors of love happening around us every day. From the labors of our kitchen staff, residents, and volunteers as they cook, prepare, and serve 3 hot meals every day, to the labors of our Processing Center staff,

J asmine was trapped in a destructive cycle and knew she needed to break free – for herself and her daughter. "My mom was a drug addict," Jasmine remembers. "She gave me and my little sister up when I was only 7."

Her mother's absence left Jasmine feeling unstable, hurt, and confused. She began turning to drugs to numb the pain by the age of 14. "I graduated high school and had a job for six months, and then the drugs took over... **I found myself homeless.**"

When her daughter was born, Jasmine knew she needed to change and find a way to provide for her. Instead, she stayed in an abusive relationship, succumbing to the pull of drugs, and hating herself for repeating the mistakes of her mother.

"I wound up in jail, and while there I prayed 'God, if you are real, please save me. Please help me. I don't know what else to do." God heard her prayer and led her to the Mission.

From the moment she arrived, Jasmine began to heal. **"I'm** constantly reminded of God's forgiveness, love, and mercy... it makes me draw closer to Him." Embracing God's grace has transformed Jasmine, motivating her to become the mother her daughter needs.

Life skills classes, biblical teaching, and a job at the donation center have all played a part in building a new life and overcoming her addiction. **"The accountability and structure have helped me develop a work ethic,** which I didn't have before." And building bonds with fellow Mission guests has given her the support she never had from stable

parents. "I have relationships with my sisters here, we're a family."

As Jasmine looks to the future, she knows she can give her daughter the love and support she needs. "I just want to give my daughter everything that I didn't have."

Jasmine has hope this Christmas – and she wants to thank YOU for supporting her journey toward a new life. "I used to look in the mirror and hate the person I saw. Now, I love myself. I have my daughter, and I trust God and His plan for us."

residents, and volunteers as they sort, price, and prepare household goods, clothing, furniture, and other items for our thrift stores, to the labors of our dedicated program staff who walk with the men, women, and children in our liferecovery program to help them overcome past traumas, and the obstacles and challenges they are facing as a result of their pain and brokenness.

Along with these incredible staff, residents, and volunteers, we also see labors of love performed every day behind the scenes by our unsung heroes: the maintenance team who diligently keep all our facilities functioning, and the business office who works tirelessly to keep the administrative side of the Mission running smoothly. These are just a few of the Mission's staff, residents in work therapy, and volunteers that constantly, day in and day out, perform labors of love to meet the needs of all those we are called to serve. But as much as our staff, residents, and volunteers work to help those in need, our labors would fall short **if not for the selfless devotion of those who support the Mission in other ways.** By donating food, clothing, and hygiene/ cleaning products, by praying on our behalf, and by donating your financial resources, **your labors of love are the foundation on which the Mission is able to rise to meet the daily challenges we face.**

During these times of inflation and economic uncertainties, **we recognize how you still go above and beyond to support this ministry.** We too are facing the rising costs of providing food, housing, and recovery services for over 190 people each day, and as these expenses continue to rise it's easy to become overwhelmed with doubt. Even if you are not with us physically, you are making a huge difference by giving your time, prayers, and financial resources.
